Janie Wilson is a professor in the Department of Surgery, Faculty of Health Sciences at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. She is also a co-director of the Dynamics of Human Motion laboratory at Dalhousie University. She runs a multidisciplinary research program in orthopaedic biomechanics, with a focus on understanding the role of joint-level biomechanics and muscle activity in the initiation, progression and treatment of osteoarthritis with arthroplasty surgery. She has specific interest in understanding how female sex and obesity interaction with joint mechanics in injury and disease, as well as the development and application of mathematical and statistical tools for biomechanics applications. She was the conference co-chair for the 2018 Canadian Society for Biomechanics meeting, and has held leadership positions in the Canadian Orthopaedic Research Society and the Orthopaedic Research Society.

Andrew Laing directs the Injury Biomechanics and Aging Laboratory at the University of Waterloo. His general field of interest is musculoskeletal biomechanics related to human health and injury prevention, and the role that advanced age has on these relationships. Within this framework, his research focuses on impact biomechanics, fall-related tissue trauma, occupational biomechanics, balance and mobility, and forensic epidemiology. Dr. Laing is Associate Chair of Graduate Studies in his department, and has an intense interest in incorporating and encouraging trainee perspectives within the biomechanics community. He conducted his doctoral and post-doctoral training in Vancouver at Simon Fraser University and the University of British Columbia, respectively; his networks within the Vancouver region have been invaluable in supporting this WCB 2026 bid proposal.






